#### **Summary of Activities of the Past Year**

The past year has come with challenges for all of us in education and it's important to note that although our short-term memory has a pandemic stamped on it and our level of productivity came with extra challenges, we still have accomplishments to share. The Higher Education Division carries a big responsibility since we are the incubator for future art educators in Texas. As we continue to promote the importance of being a part of TAEA in our art education programs, it is important to mention the opportunities that our institutions for higher education have to offer. One of those opportunities that I want to focus on is funding for undergraduate research and grant proposal initiatives.

- Between 2019 and 2020, art education students from UT-Rio Grande Valley have managed to secure 2 grants through undergraduate programs such as Engaged Scholarship & Learning and Engaged Scholarship and Artist Awards.
- Both undergraduate projects initiated community art lessons and collaborations with 3 entities in the Rio Grande Valley region including the border town of Matamoros, Tamaulipas, MX.
- CurARTE and SanARTE were the project names and the participants all had one thing in common:
   They lacked access to art experiences. These art education students were able to fill that gap with their desire to recognize the underrepresented populations in their communities.
- Although, it sounds unsafe and unreasonable to serve in a border town such as Matamoros, it is
  important to state that our HSI (Hispanic-Serving Institution) serves international students that live
  in Matamoros and commute to Brownsville, TX several times a week to attend class at UT-RGV.
- The evidence of how these workshops brought art into the lives of unsuspecting individuals in dire environments was presented at TAEA Galveston 2019.
- These opportunities easily tie into the goals of TAEA by welcoming undergraduates that will be serving in art rooms across the state and nation to join the ranks of other TAEA members.
- The intention to continue to promote and introduce our preservice art educators to undergraduate research opportunities at other colleges and universities. The result would eventually build the amount of higher education representation in TAEA.
- Our conference presentations for NAEA were halted due to the pandemic and there were other opportunities we can hopefully build on for this coming year.

- The goals for this coming year include building a listing of art education programs across the state
  that may have been overlooked or not represented, including preservice teachers in alternative
  certification programs. Hopefully, this would create more conference participation from
  colleges/universities that are not currently participating in TAEA events.
- Search undergraduate research opportunities in several higher ed institutions and highlight deadlines and application guides for undergrads across the state. Perhaps, a digital newsletter that can send out opportunity announcements highlighting TAEA events for higher ed students.
- Create an email listing of art educators from different institutions that are not currently TAEA
  members and send out information about the importance of educating preservice teachers about
  what TAEA has to offer, including opportunities for conference presentations.

### **Summary of Activities of the Past Year**

In September the Texas Art Education Association announced the 43 winners of the 2020 District of Distinction Award. The districts received the honor for providing a well-rounded education that advocates and integrates visual arts curriculum to inspire creativity and reach diverse learners. This award is sponsored by the Administration and Supervision Division.

TAEA is the leading advocate for the visual arts in the state. This is the second year that TAEA is honoring districts that meet fourteen rigorous criteria as evidenced from data.

More than 1,000 districts were eligible to apply for the 2020 award. Each district submitted documentation demonstrating they had met the rubric criteria over the 2019-2020 school year. 43 districts met the high standard and will receive this outstanding honor indicating their Visual Art Programs are in the top 4 percent of districts in the state.

Our annual fall conference has been moved to a virtual format this year. In lieu of an in person award presentation this year we have sent the awards and fun celebration supplies to each recipient district, a true **CELEBRATION IN A BOX!** Districts have been asked to film a short segment of their celebration and to pass the award to the next district (in the video). The final compilation video will be shared with our membership at the Administration and Supervision virtual meeting on November 21, 2020.

This subcommittee is responsible for arranging sites to donate for TAEA members to give back. This can be local shelters, children's home, hospitals etc... Typically donations of art materials are taken. The sub-committee is responsible for staffing a table throughout conference and taking donations to the recipient. The recipient can be invited to a General Session to present the materials and highlight giving back by the membership.

This subcommittee will closely monitor the artist lounge to make sure supplies are secure in the room. In addition, committee members will check in and check out participants for CPE credit. They will also be responsible for ordering supplies at the best price they can find for this booth.

One facilitator solicits and takes payments for a Saturday Night Artisan's Market. The facilitator is responsible for turning in necessary table needs and programs directly with the Conference Co-Chairs.

This subcommittee is responsible for securing a color guard as part of the TAEA opening ceremonies. Preferably students from the host city.

This subcommittee is responsible for securing a paid nurse for the duration of the conference, and coordinating volunteers to man the command center to serve as the information hub, lost and found, and nurse's station.

This subcommittee is responsible for soliciting bag donations for approximately 2500 participants. This sub-committee is also responsible for soliciting a necessary and reasonable amount of materials to stuff into conference bags. Advertisers pay a fee to be included in TAEA conference bags. This sub-committee also gathers local volunteers to "stuff" all bags the Wednesday evening prior to conference and makes sure that all bags are set-up behind registration for the first morning on conference.

TAEA will make the initial purchase for t-shirts to be sold at conference. This subcommittee will be responsible for passing out pre-sold shirts and checking names off the list and for selling and collecting money for shirts sold at conference

This subcommittee is responsible for creating needed decorations for all areas. Typical decorations needed are tabletop décor for receptions, stage decoration for general session and décor for the registration area. Decorations are dependent on the conference site. This sub-committee is also responsible for setting up, moving and tearing down all decorations throughout the conference. Some conferences set-up a photo-op that this sub-committee manages as well.

This subcommittee will staff the entrance to the Exhibit Hall checking badges for registered participants during all the posted Exhibit Hall hours.

This subcommittee works to program local off-site experience institutes and tours. They work with local museums, galleries and artists to provide a rich offering to conference attendees at a moderate price. Members also solicit bids and arrange off-site transportation. Members will staff each offering during the course of conference riding the bus and attending the experience institute and tour as a guide. This sub-committee also staffs the Experience Institutes & Tours table at conference throughout the event.

One individual is assigned to each general session speaker to "shadow" the speaker and assist with needs ranging from picking them up at the airport, getting them to the hotel, getting them wherever they need to be at conference and getting them back to the airport. This sub-committee also facilitates gift baskets for speakers and assists their assigned speaker during the Inside the Studio presentation.

This sub-committee also facilitates gift baskets for speakers and assists their assigned speaker during the Inside the Studio presentation.

This subcommittee is responsible for all the graphics and signs associated with conference outside the Exhibit Hall. This includes any directional signage needed to get participants around the venue(s) and other signage as needed. This sub-committee will also print all signs and install them on set-up day and remove them at clean-up.

This subcommittee facilitates the Inside the Studio presentations. Members also order supplies and make sure the supplies are returned to conference storage safely.

This sub-committee is responsible for organizing an exhibition of student work for the local area. They are also responsible for soliciting panels to install work, set-up and teardown of the exhibition. Local Art Displays are usually limited to the members of the local committee helping to plan and implement the local conference.

This subcommittee is responsible for obtaining and setting up materials for the parking lot graffiti challenge. Members will oversee and facilitate the challenge, as well as taking care of cleanup afterwards.

Liaison will reach out to the local university and junior college pre-service art students to assist with various aspects of the conference. The liaison will work directly with the students to schedule assignments and tasks.

This subcommittee is responsible for organizing and staffing volunteers to assist TAEA (MCC) staff in the registration area. Volunteers assist member check-in, get their conference bags/materials and answer questions especially during peak times when conference opens. Volunteers are needed throughout registration hours and staffing is done in consult with TAEA (MCC) staff. The leader for this group frequently is in charge of producing the volunteer t-shirt with the conference logo that can be paid for with local conference budget and given to volunteer workers to be worn during conference.

This subcommittee is responsible for conference setup, clean-up and moving out of the venue(s) at the end of conference.

This sub-committee can produce a silent auction to benefit the scholarships and grants for TAEA. The group can solicit items created by membership geared around the conference theme and use them for decoration at conference while they are being auctioned off. Past successful items have included painted frames, manikins, flamingos, shoes etc. All funds are deposited directly with TAEA.

This sub-committee is responsible for planning a evening social event for TAEA members in conjunction with the Artisan's Market. Committee will setup, decorate and tear down as needed.

This subcommittee is responsible for setting up and maintaining a storage site for deliveries related to conference approximately six months prior to the event. In addition, getting all the material associated with conference from storage into conference venues. The storage sub-committee will be accepting TRENDS shipped for conference bags, magazines like School Arts, Arts & Activities and other materials that the Bag subcommittee / President solicit.

This subcommittee will work closely with the Gold Seal Chair to setup and take down Gold Seal Exhibition.

This subcommittee solicits, schedules, and arranges all walk-up workshops during conference. This group manages 4-6 tables of short, easy to present workshops for participants who cannot get into on-site workshops or are between events.

This subcommittee is responsible for staffing, setting up and monitoring wet workshops and getting water buckets to and from the wet rooms to whatever water source is identified. As part of the set-up procedure, this group covers all wet workshop table with plastic that has been purchased using local conference budget funds.
