

Impressionistic Watercolor the West Texas Way

The TAEA Regional Workshop serves the need for members not only to study different art techniques and processes, but also a chance to interact with other art teachers that face some of the same issues in their classrooms. This summer Region 17 hosted a watercolor workshop open to all TAEA members presented by impressionistic watercolor artist Jo Beth Gilliam jobethwatercolors.blogspot.com.

This year we had a number of participants from around Region 17, and participants from 4 other regions around Texas. Most participants were from smaller school districts that do not offer art content within their districts as an option for PD and CPE hours, while others came from as far away as Plano ISD to hangout in West Texas and see what we had to offer.

To help steer the one day workshop to be less on composition and focus more on watercolor techniques, each participant started with an under drawing of a "Country Store." Participants then worked with layers and paint saturation in a limited color palette. By the end each participant had a different painting that reflected the challenges they faced, yet resulted in their personalities coming through.

Wire and Watercolor Forms

Lesson Plan for Grades 5–12





Bend: Make expressive **lines** by bending, curving, or looping sculpture wire.



Join: Arrange wire lines into shapes and join using bending or pliers. Cover with rice paper brushed with diluted glue to make a three-dimensional form.



Paint: After paper has dried and hardened, paint the sculpture using liquid

Learn how a *line* becomes a *shape* that transitions to a *form* in this simple abstract sculpture-making process.

Students will grasp concepts of 3D art as they use wire and paper to create open, expressive forms.

The event offered students and their guests a unique opportunity to view the artwork in the historic setting of the Governor's Mansion. Docents guided attendees through the home, sharing stories and historical insights about what First Lady Cecilia Abbott warmly calls "The People's Mansion."

A particularly meaningful moment came when Mrs. Abbott spent time speaking personally with each young artist, as well as their families and art teachers. She asked thoughtful questions about their creative process and the inspiration behind their work, even highlighting several of their stories during the event.

The reception was an unforgettable experience for students, families, educators, and TAEA board members—one that underscored the value of arts education and the power of student voice through visual expression.





We left the event feeling inspired, recharged, and excited to kick off a new school year with fresh energy and creative momentum!






