

Selectively Marbled Monograms

Lesson Plan for Grades 3-12





Prep: Brush Surface Prep Medium on paper card. Float Water Marbling Acrylics on prepared water



Float: Print card from water surface. Rinse. Color will cling to area prepared with Surface Prep Medium.



Paint: Once card is dry, use a Sumi brush to paint a monogram in the center of the card

Water Marbling Acrylic Paints adhere to areas brushed with Surface Prep Medium while uncoated areas rinse away.

Students create cards with selective areas marbleized, then paint a monogram in a calligraphy style using a sumi brush.



SCHOLARSHIPS

NAEA scholarships support innovators in visual arts, design, and media arts education, providing access to professional learning, leadership experience, and connectivity to the field. Please review the scholarship options listed below. Attendees may only be awarded one scholarship per year.

The NAEA Art Educator Scholarship Fund supports art educators seeking further professional learning opportunities through the many programs and events offered by NAEA. These scholarships support



innovators in visual arts, design, and media arts education, providing access to professional learning, leadership experience, and connectivity to the field. Details on applying for the 2024 NAEA National Convention will be posted in Fall 2023.

Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (ED&I) Scholarships

The NAEA ED&I Commission offers a scholarship opportunity that is designed to increase equity, diversity, and inclusion in the field of visual arts, design, and media arts education and remove barriers to access for underserved and underrepresented individuals. The scholarship includes complimentary registration to the 2025 NAEA National Convention, up to three (3) nights of hotel accommodations in an NAEA designated hotel, and one year of membership to NAEA (not to be combined with state association membership). This scholarship is open to all visual arts and design educators. Up to 10 individuals will be selected, with a priority focus on first-time NAEA National Convention participants and Preservice educators.

First-Time Attendee Scholarships

This scholarship is designed to support visual art educators that are first-time attendees of an NAEA National Convention. Four First-Time Attendee Scholarships are awarded. This scholarship will cover complimentary registration to the 2023 NAEA National Convention, up to three (3) nights of hotel accommodations in an NAEA designated hotel; and a travel stipend of up to \$300 for transportation, meals, and incidentals. This scholarship is open to all NAEA Members.

Art Educator Scholarships

This scholarship is designed to support visual art educators in their path of continued professional learning. Complimentary registration to the 2023 NAEA National Convention. Ten scholarships will be awarded. This scholarship is open to all NAEA Members.

Kathy Duse Scholarship Fund

Kathy Duse worked for NAEA for 39 years, and during this time played an important role in shaping the NAEA National Convention, as well as supporting association programs, governance, operations, and more. In honor of Kathy's vast contributions to NAEA, the Kathy Duse Fund for NAEA National Convention Scholarships was established just before her retirement in 2024. Proceeds donated in Kathy's contribute to NAEA's Art Educator Scholarship Fund, providing assistance for NAEA National Convention attendance.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Cristina Ann Correa, MFA

Plano Senior High School, Plano ISD

How did you get into teaching?

To be vulnerable, I got into art teaching by chance: I studied for a career in broadcast iournalism & film. A few weeks after I graduated from college at Texas Woman's University, I gave birth to my son, Jaxin, and moved back to the Rio Grande Valley. I found out about my first art teaching position from my mother, who is a retired elementary principal. With my 4-dayold son in tow, I went to the interview and was hired! Sometimes life takes us in unexpected directions, and I'm so glad mine did!

What do you love most about teaching art?

More than anything, I love the fact that teaching art requires you to continuously learn and refine your own artistic practice. As someone who was a music person before ever becoming an art person, I think its important to be able to empathize with the struggles our students may be having. Being a practicing artist not only strengthens my capacity to empathize, but also creates a shared bond as artists. When times are tough or work is exhausting, its reinvigorating to remind myself of this.

What is your favorite medium to work with?

I am 100% a mixed media artist, because I love the thrill of experimenting with a variety of media and finding creative ways to reuse old materials. We are fortunate to have The Wellman Project in Fort Worth, which supplies educators with free materials for creative reuse. Given my background in mixed media, I have loved bringing in a variety of alternative media to see how my students decide to interact with it. Their work is incredible, and it inspires me to experiment even morel







What's something about you that not many people may know?

I struggle immensely with imposter syndrome, despite all the opportunities I've had as an artist and art educator. I think that in art education and art, we need to do better with the way we engage newbies and outsiders. Each of us has unlimited amounts of potential, and when gatekeeping happens or assumptions get made based on a person's previous experience (or lack thereof), it can really get stuck in your head. I would love to see change in Texas art education in this regard; every child deserves an opportunity to have a high quality arts education.

Share a special memory/moment from your time as an art educator.

My absolute favorite moments from my time as an art educator are the ones where I find out about former students who have either gone on to become art teachers themselves, practicing artists, or art historians. Art has such a magical way of helping people to feel seen, heard, and validated for who they are and what experiences they've lived. It makes me tear up a little to know that they're out in the world, sharing their wisdom and creativity with a variety of new people and communities.
