# Our Best & Brightest: 2005 Award Winners

Each year, the Texas Art Education Association honors individuals who have made significant contributions to the organization. Nominees have accumulated outstanding records of professional achievement and service over a period of time. We want to recognize these individuals for their stellar accomplishments. TAEA members are encouraged to nominate any individual who has gone that extra mile to further the cause of art education in our state and nation.

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## ***Texas Art Educator of the Year***

***...is awarded to one TAEA member who has significantly contributed to the association and to art education on the state, local, and/or national levels.***

### **2005 Texas Art Educator of the Year: Joseph F. Doyle, III**

Joseph R. Doyle, III, is Aldine Independent School District's Program Director for Visual Arts. Joey has served as coordinator of elementary art and as a middle and high school art educator. Joey has been a fixture of TAEA since very early in his career and has served the association through multiple roles.



Joey is known as an outstanding teacher and administrator not only in Texas, but also across the country. He was instrumental in starting the National Art Education Association's Middle Level/Junior High Division, now a strong group addressing the needs of students and teachers at this critical stage.

Joey has served TAEA as Regional Representative, State Treasurer, Vice-President of Youth Art Month, and Staff Development Coordinator. He has served as Chair of the Constitution Revision Committee, as a member of the Long Range Task Force Committee, and as Co-Chairman for the Fall Conferences in Houston and Galveston. He is currently the State Director for Visual Arts Scholastic Event (VASE) and Gold Seal Exhibitions.

In his statement, Joey writes, "I have been committed to the cause, vision, and philosophy of TAEA throughout my entire teaching career. As a classroom teacher I took on positions of leadership in this organization. I have been willing to serve in any capacity, from hanging artwork to serving as YAM Chairman, as a conference workshop presenter, or a member of the Council. I have served at the local, state, and national levels, committing myself to the cause of art and art education, bringing my passion for excellence and high standards to every task.

I have recently entered a new phase in my life: fatherhood. With two children preparing for their first days of elementary school, I am more driven than ever to solidify the role that visual literacy has in education and that proper visual arts instruction has in the classroom."

Joey has remained active to ensure the strength and growth of art education in Texas and in the nation. He is a tireless advocate and is not afraid to do what it takes to ensure success for students and teachers. As Jim Collins, author of *Good to Great*, states, "Leadership is about vision. But leadership is equally about creating a climate where the truth is heard and the brutal facts confronted."

Joey has been a facilitator in guiding TAEA through many changes and challenges. His steadfast commitment to this organization is commendable.

## **2005 Elementary Division Outstanding Art Educator: Alisa A. Meli**

“Art is my passion, and I want to instill that passion in my students,” states Alisa Meli, Art Specialist for Miller Elementary School in Plano ISD. Alisa has been an elementary art teacher in that district for 12 years. Prior to teaching in Plano, Alisa taught art in Germany for the Department of Defense schools. She received a Bachelor’s of Science in Art Education and a MA in Art Education from the University of North Texas.



Bobbie Sniderwin, elementary art specialist and Plano Area Art Educators Association Past-President, states, “Alisa personally grew as an artist through her graduate studies. She knows how important it is to follow a passion and wants to provide this opportunity to her students.”

Janice Truitt, Art Coordinator for Plano ISD, shares that “Alisa is one of those excellent art teachers who can be called for help when the need arises. I strongly feel that she is an excellent role model for other teachers.”

Alisa is the Fine Arts Team Leader and Fine Arts Vertical Team Leader and serves on the school’s SBIC. Last year she was elected Teacher of the Year for Miller Elementary. Alisa has been a member of TAEA and NAEA on and off since college.

Currently, she is the TAEA Elementary Division Chair. She has presented workshops at state and regional conferences and has served as the Elementary Division Committee Chair for the TAEA State Textbook Review Committee. She has served on the executive board of the Plano Area Art Educators Association as the secretary and is currently the President.

Alisa’s greatest love is the children she teaches. Susan Dantzler, principal of Miller Elementary explains. “The impact she has on the students at Miller is tremendous. She makes art come to life for the boys and girls. Alisa is a gifted educator who instills in children the love of art.”

Alisa writes, “Three years ago at an art educators’ conference in San Antonio, I was listening to Eric Jensen talk about his research in fine arts education and its role in brain development when he said something that struck a chord with me. He said that in the twenty-first century, the fundamentals of education will no longer be reading, writing and arithmetic, but will be creativity, problem-solving, and technology. To succeed as adults, children

had to learn those skills. It was then that I realized I taught one of the most important subjects in school. I was the art teacher, and creativity was the heart of the art curriculum!”

## **2005 Middle School/Junior High Division Outstanding Art Educator: Terese Frigo Kitts**



The phrase “the pursuit of excellence” applies to Terese Kitts, the Art Department Chair at Coppell Middle School North. Statements such as “opening our children’s eyes to the wonderful and imaginative world of art” and “she is one teacher who really influenced students and took them to the next level” are quotes from her students’ parents and her school colleagues.

One of her former students shared, “She has a radiant passion for teaching art; she has made a lasting impact on my life, and she has inspired me to take something simple and make it into something beautiful.”

Terese has promoted the appreciation of art through monthly displays of student art work in the school district’s administration building, her school, the city library, and at Junior VASE. She has demonstrated the importance of integrating the arts in all subject areas in the academic core. Her principal writes, “The artworks created and produced by Terese’s students far surpass the norm for students of the same age throughout the Dallas/Ft. Worth Metroplex area.”

Terese is a member of TAEA, NAEA, and TCEA. As a member of the Lewisville Arts League, she served as the coordinator for the districtwide art show. She has also served as juror for the area VASE events. Terese had over 30 students participate in the first Region 10 Junior VASE event. For the past two years Terese served as Regional Director for Region 10 Middle School VASE hosted by Coppell Middle School North. She led the first UIL Art Scholastic team, and they brought home many medals. She began the very first chapter of Junior National Art Honor Society in Coppell and now has a very active chapter of 60 middle school students. Her students have participated annually in Youth Art Month, local Arts and Rhythm Exhibitions and Junior VASE.

Terese has been an art instructor for students from kindergarten through university level. Terese Frigo Kitts wants to offer students an opportunity to awaken the

artist within through observation, imagination, and experience. She gives willingly and enthusiastically of her time and her art expertise. Her passion for art is contagious to her students and her colleagues.

## 2005 High School Division Outstanding Art Educator: Michael Hall

Michael Hall is an art teacher at MacArthur High School in the Aldine ISD. He serves his campus and district as the Fine Arts department chairman. At the state level, Mike is the TAEA Vice-President for Youth Art Month and the official TAEA Photographer. Mike has taken an active leadership role in regional and state Visual Art Scholastic Event events for many years, and is a member of the VASE Blue Ribbon Committee.



On Mike's nomination letter, Joey Doyle, Aldine ISD Program Director of Visual Arts, wrote, "Mike epitomizes all of the characteristics art education holds as its dearest treasures. He is a compassionate, dedicated teacher, visionary leader, extraordinary artist, and a remarkable individual. Educators like Mike Hall are the new visionaries."

Mike's "Live Life" philosophy is summed up in the following quote:

"Americans are asking,  
'What is expected of us?'  
I ask you to live your lives  
and hug your children."

Hugging my kids has been the easy part. The events of 9-11 have made me reconsider how I am "living my life." I just started running, and between June of 2002 and July 2005, I have run in 17 events, including the 2005 Houston half-marathon. Most of these events have been with my family—Tracey, my wife (a run-walker), and my two daughters, who compete in kids' events. My daughter says "Okay, we will jog to the next light pole, and then run past the next pole, and then we will walk." She makes sure we keep up this "jog, run, walk" pace at each passing streetlight. At the age of five she already understands the concept of setting goals and pacing oneself.

How is this philosophy like teaching art? As far as making connections go, you can exchange the words "life" or "running" for the words "art" or "teaching." Teaching, art, and life are all integrated. Making life connections with students, setting examples for students and co-workers, the trust of commitment, and real-life experiences all go a long way in learning and teaching art.

## 2005 Higher Education Division Outstanding Art Educator: Christina B. Bain



Christina has been an assistant professor of art education at the University of North Texas since 2001. Her teaching duties focus on the preparation of art teachers, both at the elementary and secondary levels.

Kristin Ireland writes on her letter of recommendation, "Dr. Bain has truly exceeded my expectations of what a college professor can be.

She consistently brings outstanding integrity to her classroom every day, living the example to her students that teaching is not a matter of transposing knowledge and information to a learner, but it is an opportunity to share in meaningful experiences with others.

Teaching at the college level is important to her because she believes that more communication needs to occur between universities and schools and that only by working together we can train the best quality art teachers. Elizabeth Willett stated in her letter, "I am extremely impressed with her work. I have had the opportunity to meet many of her former students, who have become active young art educators. She provides students with all the tools necessary to become successful teachers and continues to give them support and guidance as they begin their careers in education."

In addition to her current teaching duties, Christina serves as the Coordinator for Student Teaching and Observation Placements for the Art Education Department at UNT and arranges more than 200 art placements annually in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

Christina has published in the *Journal of Art Education*, *School Arts*, *NAEA Advisory*, *GAEA Journal*, *Texas Trends*, and *Making Invisible Histories of Art Education Visible*. She was recently appointed to the Editorial Review Board for the *Journal of Art Education* and has received many other honors in her career.

Dr. Christina Bain is a credit to art education and has worked on many levels to promote, support, prepare, and educate outstanding art professionals across the state and country. As an educator, she epitomizes the ideal balance of scholar and teacher.

## **2005 Museum Education Division Outstanding Art Educators: Eva Buttacavoli and Michaela Black**



At the Austin Museum of Art, Eva Buttacavoli (Director of Exhibitions and Education) and Michaela Black (Associate Director of Education) are dedicated to providing museum visitors with accessible, interactive, and enjoyable learning experiences that are designed to be collaborative, inclusive, energetic, informal, and open to new ideas.

With over 35 years of teaching experience between them, Eva and Michaela understand how challenging, yet rewarding, the art specialist's job is, and they strive to help Austin's educators promote visual literacy and establish a pattern of lifelong museum-going among their students.

They have the privilege of getting to know Austin's art educators first-hand through ongoing workshops that are free and open to teachers of all subject areas and levels. Eva and Michaela provide workshop opportunities for teachers to meet and learn from artists and curators, and they include free teacher packets with interdisciplinary lesson plans that are aligned with the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills.

Eva and Michaela work flexibly with teachers to create a format for each visit that accommodates each school's specific needs. They make access easy for any teacher who desires such museum experience for his or her students. They are proud to be associated with so many teachers who make field trips to the museum part of their curriculum each year.

Once students enter the museum's doors, their goal is to enrich lives by providing not only exposure to works of art, but also opportunities for them to express their feelings, find personal meaning in what they are seeing, and develop appreciation for other cultures through sequential questioning strategies that allow this self-discovery.

Eva Buttacavoli and Michaela Black have made it their mission to encourage and inspire arts education in Austin as they demonstrate how arts education is an essential element of a sound education in general. In pursuing this mission, they have enabled and empowered every student in Austin and the surrounding areas to visit the museum.

To quote Sara Belknap, Arts Specialist from Mathews Elementary, "In an age where we tout TEKS-based and TAKS-based curriculum, the Education Department at the Austin Museum of Art is providing reality-based, experience-based, passion-based, and lifelong learning-based art education to the Austin community."

## **2005 Supervision/Administration Division Outstanding Art Educator: Charlsey Sharon Chumley, Ed. D**



Due to the vision, creativity, motivation, inspiration, and research brought to the forefront by Dr. Charlsey Sharon Chumley, the Northside ISD Visual Arts Department of San Antonio, Texas, stands solid as a model in cutting-edge teaching strategies, quality-trained art instructors, and depth of curriculum delivered. Dr. Chumley is a consummate professional art educator,

demonstrating and practicing the strategies and skills required of her staff.

Under her guidance, NISD visual arts initiatives have elevated in quality, quantity, and diversity. Student success is observed in a host of art exhibits that have expanded to new exhibit areas within her district and city, along with the congressional offices of elected officials and state sponsored endeavors. With Dr. Chumley's leadership, vertical and horizontal visual arts curriculum alignment is being accomplished in Northside ISD to meet state and national standards for quality art education. Given the diversity and economics of the district's and the vast size of its programs, this task is truly a significant accomplishment.

- A sample of Dr. Chumley's accomplishments include:
- ★ Creating and implementing multiple, voluntary, evening and weekend visual arts professional development workshops.
  - ★ Designing and organizing several major districtwide exhibits that fill large field houses with K-12 student works.
  - ★ Teaming with a mayor's committee to establish, promote, and activate a community art festival.
  - ★ Constructing, supervising, and implementing the visual arts component of her district's US Department of Education grant (\$330, 000).

With regard to educational philosophy, Dr. Chumley truly believes in synergism and uses this approach when creating, building, and enhancing programs. She continually emphasizes programs that are student-centered and process-oriented.


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## **National Art Honor Society Sponsor Award**

## **2005 Honoree for National Art Honor Society Sponsor: Tyra Lee Gonzales**

Mrs. Gonzales has been involved in NJAHS chapter #445 at East Central Heritage Middle School since its inception two years ago. She previously sponsored NAHS chapter #1255 at South San Antonio High School, where she taught for five years. In her short time at Heritage Middle School, she has developed and



implemented many visual arts projects.

Her leadership ability has led the club to be a model for others. For many of middle school students, NJAHS is their first experience being in an organized club. Club members have created banners for an elementary school book fair, Heritage Broadcast News, Halloween Spooktacular, band concerts, and Memorial Day events.

During the 2004-2005 school year, the club received third place at the Monopoly/McDonald's sidewalk contest at the middle school level. The club sponsored two

shows at local restaurants in the district, providing a public venue for students to exhibit their talent. Members earned money and organized field trips to the McNay Art Museum and the San Antonio Museum of Art

As a high school sponsor from 1992-97, Mrs. Gonzales kept the club very busy. Many of the other school activities—including band, drama, football, and school dances—benefited from the work of NAHS. Members attended a portfolio review at Texas State University, and they visited several other college campuses as well, including UT, Trinity University, Palo Alto College, and the San Antonio and Houston Art Institutes.

The club sponsored the district art show for three years, along with a show at Palo Alto College. Students organized field trips to art museums in San Antonio, Houston, and Austin. Many students earned letter jackets for their efforts. Mrs. Gonzales also made sure students were recognized for art honors at graduation.

Tyra has an active life with church, and she is an orange belt in karate, in which she helps instruct children. Cub Scouts is another passion for her. She has been a den leader for five years and was selected for the Mission Tejas Scouter of the Year Award for 2003. She is currently enrolled at Texas Tech University, working on her Masters in Art Education, with emphasis on traditional art and instructional technology.

## **2005 Principal of the Year Honoree: Richard Galvan**



Richard Galvan is the principal of Russell Elementary School in Brownsville ISD. He has worked for BISD 21 years as a teacher, vice-principal, and principal. He supports the arts because he understands the importance of art as part of a complete academic education.

Richard makes sure that his students get acknowledged for their fine arts

achievements—even during morning announcements each day.

Belinda Burns, art teacher at Russell, stated in her letter of recommendation, “Each year Richard Galvan provides funding for our art program. Other schools in our area have cut their art programs; however, he has managed to include the arts as a part of the school’s regular budget.”

Roxana Cantu, Lopez High School art teacher, wrote, “He always finds solutions to any obstacle and encourages teachers always to integrate their curriculum into the visual arts. He has encouraged me to grow as an art educator.”

Mr. Richard Galvan expresses his philosophy of arts in education by saying, “As I reflect on the need for the arts in the lives of school children of all ages, it is important that we recall that throughout time, the arts have been essential in the development of the human experience. The arts open doors that enhance students’ imagination and creativity and enriches their quality of life. All students deserve to participate in the arts and a chance to celebrate beauty, self-expression, and cultural diversity. They should have an understanding that everyone is unique and that the acceptance of differences makes a person’s character even stronger. I also believe that teachers must be provided the training in order to differentiate the curriculum and make the arts part of their everyday teaching journey.”

Mr. Richard Galvan is a true arts advocate who understands the value of art education in the public schools. His leadership is an inspiration to educators, administrators, and our community.

## **2005 Friend of Art Education Honoree: Penelope Speier**



Penelope involved with the O4Arts Foundation and is a trainer with Visual Thinking Strategies. She has raised over \$600,000 to fund VTS training in the San Antonio Independent School district, starting with one school and three teachers and ultimately training over 400 teachers on 60 campuses over the past six years. Besides the training, these teachers

received free supplies, stipends, and support from Teacher Coordinators from the San Antonio Museum of Art, the McNay, and the San Antonio Fine Arts Department. Penelope has presented the VTS workshop at the TAEA conferences in Lubbock and San Antonio and at the CEDFA Fine Arts Summit.

Penelope created VTS Family Days at the San Antonio Museum of Art and the Blue Star Contemporary Art Center, events that have been highly successful. The Family Day events are held twice a year with 1500-2000 attendees and 100-200 volunteers. These events incorporate the family unit into the learning process with the intent of servicing inner-city families and creating long-range cultural patronage.

In her personal philosophy she writes, “Visual art has been a guiding force for me throughout my life. My own work as an artist has led me to a lifetime of helping others make connections through the arts. The qualities of observation and reflection are qualities that we teach with the Visual Thinking Strategies curriculum. This methodology teaches students values that are overlooked today in our society, the value of taking the time to look and listen.”

Kathryn Nanjo, Art Pace Executive Director, states on her letter of recommendation, “Penelope’s effort have touched all of us in the education and visual arts worlds in San Antonio. She is personally motivated and motivating, as witnessed by her success.” At the June, 2005, meeting of San Antonio ISD Board of Education, Penelope was recognized as a Friend of Education. ★


**Rookies & Veterans Confer in Austin**

**YAM Capitol Exhibit Set for March 5**



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

# Our Studio: Junction Heat

The outside world dissolves as you turn through the Double T Gates, Texas Tech at Junction. A slow drive past the main buildings, a right at the cafeteria, and you reach an open building—the glass studio.

Walking up to the studio, you are aware of the roar of the furnace. Cedar posts support the metal roof of the central area, and nature flows through the space from the meadow beyond. Deer roam by as birds perch in the trees next to the studio.

On tables under an attached shed roof, boxes of colored glass glimmer in the morning sun. Color rods, bottles of crushed glass, and pieces of sheet glass are spilling onto the tables. The artists use them all to create the many colors and patterns of the blown glass.

The roar of the furnace, a day tank that contains 200-250 pounds of molten clear glass, reminds you of the heat of the studio. The furnace glows with a white-orange heat as flames lick around the edges of the door. Dale and Vickie greet you. The other artists—Angie, Carole and Dohn—are busy blowing, but they greet you as they can.

Even though glass had been a medium at Texas Tech at Lubbock, demonstrations were the only glass at Junction until 1983. That year, the studio was built under the supervision of Bill Bagley. Bill's vision in Junction was a studio where artists could create glass freely without boundaries. When Bill passed away, it took the artists and staff coming together to find a direction for the studio.

Dale Battle and Vickie Bunting took over the duties of the studio. Dale cared for and constructed equipment. Vickie handled the paperwork and helped coordinate the studio. From this new beginning a unique program was developed.



A group of artists gathers every year to design and produce work. For three to six weeks the furnace roars. The artists work 14-18 hours daily, stopping at the end of the day to load the furnace and cook the next batch of glass. All the studio time is spent blowing and either maintaining or constructing equipment.

Two blowers' benches now sit in front of the furnace. To the right of the furnace, a gloryhole stands ready to reheat and work the glass. On the west end of the space there are three leers; one made from a refrigerator, the next from an old chest freezer, and then a large one custom-made by Bill and his students. Each leer is lined with ceramic fiber and wired with coils to heat it.

Dale is at the studio around 6 a.m. checking the glass for clarity. Raising and lowering the temperature clears the seed bubbles from the glass. After breakfast, the artists gather to unload the leers of the previous day's work. The glass is placed on the grass by the studio for the Texas test: If it can stand the extremes of the Texas sun without breaking, it passes.

The gloryhole roars and the leer heats up. The day starts as a breeze picks up, cooling the artists. The artists cut the glass rods and gather up the color they will use. Pipes are heated and the first colors of the day are picked up. At a steady pace the artist moves back and forth to the bench, furnace, and gloryhole, gathering glass and adding color.

The others assist in bringing color and a punt to allow for the opening of the glass. Everyone works, performing at the direction of the head artist. A simple, wet, folded newspaper and a pair of stainless steel jacks shape the glass.



Torches, paddles, diamond shears, optic molds, and other tools are within reach of each bench.

Because the tank and gloryhole, when open, throw off tremendous heat, several fans are running. The noise is loud so a hand gesture or a nod of the head can be a direction among the artists. Suddenly, the piece is finished and placed back in the gloryhole. The air is cut off to the gloryhole, causing a reduction of the colors in the glass.

Two assistants prepare themselves, one putting on gloves as another prepares to open the leer. The artist cools the glass on the punt with a tool. With a gentle tap, the piece falls into the hands of the gloved assistant. The leer opens and the glass is loaded to anneal.

Without walls or storage, this space is about the process. The word "rustic" may be an apt description of the space, but the details add up to a unique studio in which intense creativity and fabrication takes place. The



studio has become a valuable asset to the art community of Texas. Open to the environment and the will of the artist, you cannot underestimate the inspiration of Junction Heat. ★



# 2006 TAEA GRANT INFORMATION

## General Guidelines for Grant

- I. 1. The grant is earmarked for direct personal professional development, i.e., research, professional activities, creative work publications, etc.
2. The grant is generally to encourage new work, but work already begun will be considered.
3. Funding will not be offered for projects geared solely to educational activities, supplies or materials, which should be funded by your institution.
4. Funding request for meals or books will not be honored.
5. The grant will be awarded to **current TAEA members only**.

## Guidelines for Grant Disbursement

- II. 1. Each application consists of a one page standard form available from TAEA Executive Secretary or the TAEA President, plus support materials.
2. The 2006 grant will not exceed \$300.
3. The grant will be awarded July 30; **deadline to apply is June 30**.
4. The grant will be awarded by the TAEA Executive Committee who are not eligible to apply.
5. Funds will be given July 30.
6. A member may not receive more than one grant in a two-year period.
7. TAEA member receiving the grant will agree to present a workshop on the funded project/research/creative activity at the next fall conference.

## Guidelines for Grant Application Form

- III. 1. Section I. Fill out completely. Incomplete forms will not be reviewed.
2. Section II. Total amount not to exceed \$300.
3. Section III.
  - A. **General Description of Project** -  
Give a brief description of what project entails.
  - B. **Current Status of Project** -  
If project is underway, give a status report and what will be necessary to finish.
  - C. **Anticipated Outcomes** -  
With completion of the project, will you be publishing, having an exhibit, lecturing, regarding your findings, etc?
  - D. **Timeline** -  
Show your proposed time line with as specific dates as possible.
  - E. **Itemized Budget** -  
Prepare a DETAILED LIST of expenses covering the requested amount of the grant. Be specific. List items and their costs.
  - F. **Final Report** -  
A final report on your grant is due within one year after you receive your grant. Failure to meet this requirement line II-7 will preclude your further involvement in the TAEA Grant Program.
