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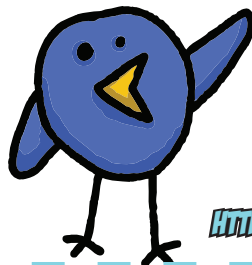

OUTSTANDING ART EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR AWARDS

.....are awarded to one TAEA member from each division/category who has significantly contributed to the association and to art education on the state, local and/or national levels.

2009 Elementary Division.....

Samantha Melvin

Samantha believes that every child is an artist and a thinker. "My teaching philosophy is to create an environment that builds an appreciation for the arts and a platform for self-expression. Each person has the ability to express creatively that which defines them as an individual. It is my role as an art teacher to help my students connect to themselves and to others through the arts. Art education is the education of the whole child" states Mrs. Melvin.



Samantha is one of the exemplary elementary art educators of our time. She is an award winner in her own right and seeks to spread the good word of "art education is at the core of all learning" to the world. Samantha is a visual arts teacher at RJ Richey Elementary, Burnet CISD in Burnet, TX and she formerly taught at Hunters Creek Elementary in Spring Branch ISD, Houston, TX. She was awarded Burnet CISD's Teacher of the Year and RJ Richey Elementary Teacher of the Year, 2008-09.

Currently, she is the TAEA Elementary Division Chair serving on the Council-At-Large as well as the NAEA Western Region Elementary Division Representative. She was named to the NAEA Purposes, Principles, and Standards for School Art Programs Committee in June 09. Samantha also moderates the TAEA Elementary list-serv and the TX Art Teachers Site on the web. She is the co-founder of The Global ART Initiative, a non-profit organization geared to providing support for and awareness of artists with disabilities. Samantha is currently a board member on the Burnet Cultural Arts Association. She is a writer for TRENDS and other art education publications.

2009 Middle School/Junior High Division.....

Eileen McClellan

"I love being a teacher and I especially love teaching art. It seems simplistic, but I believe love to be, by its very nature, the essence of successful teaching. Providing a stimulating and inspirational environment for students is also a vital element to that success. Quality art education is much more than teaching techniques and manipulating materials. Those factors are undeniably basic to an art program; but a nurturing, kind atmosphere fosters risk-taking and artists must take



risks to grow and mature in their work” cites Eileen when discussing art education. Her passion for teaching shows up in her classroom, when she presents to other teachers and in working with associations and the community.

Eileen is currently teaching art at West Briar Middle School, Houston ISD and also with the Rice University Summer Programs. She formerly taught at Grady Middle School, T.H. Rogers, both in Houston and Lackey High School in Indian Head, Maryland. Eileen has been “Teacher of the Year” at every school she has taught in. Mrs. McClellan’s students are continuously winning regional, state and national awards. Eileen is published and has had many juried shows; Visual Arts Alliance Annual 26th Juried Open, Live Oak Art Center Annual juried exhibition and Women’s Art Exhibit, INNOVA Design center as examples. She is a presenter in school districts, Museums, at the TAEA annual conference and at NAEA conferences.

Her words of wisdom to art educators are “keep a sense of humor! Be organized and prepared. Stay current and fresh and have surprises up your sleeves. Give students choices and make lessons relevant to their lives. Expect and demand excellence!”



2009 High School.....

Connie Young

Connie Young is currently teaching art at Bandera High School. She received her BS in Education from Texas State (formally Southwest Texas State University) in 1977. She taught at Aldine HS, Tomball HS, Waller and Stockdale ISD. Her current program includes photography, drawing, digital art and AP 2-D classes. Connie inspires her students to develop excellence in creating art. Her goal is to open doors of opportunity in viewing

art, creating art and developing their love of art. She stimulates her student’s artistic growth with personal experiences as an artist.

Connie’s personal art work depicts the hill country in photography and painting and is displayed in local galleries and exhibits. Some of the exhibits have been in the Kerrville Art Cultural Center, Hill Country Art Foundation, and The Western Museum in Kerrville, The Frontier Museum, and Bandera County Library in Bandera.

2009 Higher Education.....

Paul Bolin

Dr. Bolin is a Professor of Art Education/Visual Arts Studies at the University of Texas at Austin since 2001. Formerly he was Assistant/Associate Professor of Art Education at Pennsylvania State University and Adjunct Assistant Professor at the University of Oregon. Paul comes to TAEA with a wealth of knowledge and experience. He currently holds the TAEA Higher Education Division Chair position and is heavily involved in NAEA activities. He is a member of the Editorial Review Board for Studies in Art Education since 1997; member and current Treasurer of the Council for Policy Studies in Art Education; former Editor of Art Education and member of the National Art Education Association Research Commission Task Force.

"My teaching centers on helping students identify significant content and issues present in the world and art world, and assisting students in learning to explore these important ideas and subject matter in relation to possible pasts, presents, and futures" states

Dr. Bolin. He also relates that "Two instructional features guide much of my teaching. The first primary characteristic of my art education instruction is the critical use of questions. I encourage and model a dialogue of questions with my students. The second feature is that I try and cultivate a sense of collaboration within the educational experience."

Dr. Bolin is a very busy man on behalf of art education. He teaches, writes, serves on various boards and committees and makes hundreds of formal presentation/workshops throughout the Texas, the United States and Canada. He is an honored member of NAEA's Fellows, Recipient of the 2007 Manual Barkan Memorial Award and recipient of the 2002 Pennsylvania Art Educator of the Year Award.

2009 Museum.....

Stacy Fuller

Stacy has taken Museum Education to a new level of experience. She is the Director of Education at the Amon Carter Museum in Fort Worth, Texas. Stacy is the Director over all educational programs for Amon Carter which includes school tour, educator training, teacher resources, distance learning, public programs, online teaching resources and accessibility initiatives. Stacy does all of this and more with a smile on her face!



Stacy believes that art is for everyone. "This simple phrase has been my guiding force since I entered the field of museum education and has shaped every program and resource that

I've developed at the Amon Carter Museum." The idea of including all content teachers in her educational program went right along with her philosophy. Her department serves over 5,000 educators each year. She is heavily involved in the training of museum staff as well as the community. The Amon Carter has a world renowned program thanks to Stacy.

Allen Miller is in his thirty eight year as an Arts Educator and his eleventh year as Director of Arts Education for the Humble Independent School District. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree and a Master of Arts Degree from Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas where he received certifications in Fine Arts Education, School Supervision, and School Administration. Prior to his appointment as Director of Arts Education, Mr. Miller served as the Director of Bands at Austin Junior High in Beaumont, Texas, Director of Bands at Humble Middle School, and Assistant Principal at Humble High School. He is

an active member of the Texas Arts Education Association, Houston Area Art Supervisors, Texas Music Educators Association, Texas Dance Educators Association, Texas Educational Theater Association, Houston Area Music Administrators, and the Texas Music Administrators Conference. He has served as the Region 4 East VASE Director since 1999 during which he was instrumental in standardizing entry processes and assisting VASE officials to format and implement the current online entry website.

Robert Sormani

Robert is a fine arts principal! He currently is the principal at Chisholm Trail Middle School in Round Rock ISD in the Austin area. He has been honored as Dobie Middle School Teacher of the Year and is serving now on the Round Rock Superintendent's Executive Leadership Team.



Tim Lowke, Round Rock Art Supervisor, and Mr. Sormani developed a new plan to help struggling at-risk students in the district. They planned and organized a pilot program for at-risk math students to collaborate with the visual arts since the student's hated math but loved art. During the 2008-09 school year, Robert outlined to his staff his vision of teaching math concepts using the visual arts. From this vision, they created a class that combined Art and Math curriculum. Throughout the year he provided guidance to the team in making curricular connections between the different TEKS and helped in refining the new curriculum. He also provided both time, in the form of teaching units and substitutes, as well as money for new supplies. As a result our target students were more engaged and improved their scores on most of the objectives. They also learned a lot about which concepts are best taught through art.

2009 Friends of Art Education.....

Kari Rhame-Murphy

Kari has been an incredible supporter and assistant to the promotion of art education and especially to the State Visual Arts Scholastic Event for many years.

Kari is truly one of the most dedicated individuals I have had the opportunity to work with. She has retired now but left a lasting impression on the minds of many of her students. “Give children the tools, skills, and knowledge and they will create, communicate and become problem solvers as well as lifelong learners.” Nina loved teaching middle school children and she used many strategies including her own brand of humor.

Ms. Bothe now is an adjunct faculty member at the University of North Texas. When Nina retired from her public school teaching career, UNT was lucky enough to hire her as one of the art student teacher supervisors. “Nina is a consummate professional, dependable, reliable, personable, and a strong role model. In fact, last year I assigned a very challenging student teacher to her. This student started the semester with a chip on her shoulder, but under Nina’s tutelage, this student absolutely blossomed. Indeed, Nina has motivated and assisted many UNT student teachers who are now making a positive difference in the field. She continues to mentor many of these young professionals even after they graduate, offering on-going guidance and support.” states Christina Bain, Coordinator of Student Teachers for UNT.

Nina has tirelessly served the Texas Art Education Association in many capacities over the years, most recently as the TAEA President. Under Nina’s leadership our organization has continued to flourish and grow. Nina has served TAEA in many roles such as Credentials Chair, Parliamentarian, Area Representative, and Secretary and through her term of office, she worked on Western Region Committees. She served on NAEA’s Delegates Assembly for five years. She is a strong role model for both novice and experienced art teachers. Congratulations to our Art Educator of the Year!

AT THE CORE

As art educators we see the growth of each of our students when they are given quality, sequentially-based art instruction. Their development from Pre-Kindergarten and up is not only to be evaluated in terms of their management of media and technique, but also in terms of their intellectual and creative growth. Are we asking them the right questions? Are we expecting them to problem-solve and be creative and critical thinkers, or are we simply providing lessons that demand cookie-cutter replication? We must constantly push for process over product and providing an easy or quick answer is not the solution no matter the discipline. Of great interest of late is the Partnership for 21st Century Skills, which outlines on its site the philosophy shared by many, of an education that expects cultural and global understanding, and demands the ability to communicate, problem-solve and collaborate. It requires flexibility, adaptability, innovation and creativity. Sounds a lot like an art classroom, doesn't it? Art is a part of 21st Century Skills! BUILDING ON A FOUNDATION – THE 3 R's OF EDUCATION PLUS ONE

At our Dallas Conference Secondary Division Meeting discussions were built around the importance of Relationships, Relevance, Rigor, and Resilience. While all these topics have been discussed, at the Secondary Division Meeting we revisited these topics to build a better understanding of the significance in our studio classrooms.

Relationships are vital to the education process. Some of the helpful hints discussed in our group experience were an informational letter to students from you at the beginning of school. Let them know a little about you and ask them to write a return letter to you. Give extra credit if the student will take the letter home, share with an adult and have the adult write a letter back to you. Let's the family know a little about you other than just being the art teacher.

Relevance and connections for the student artist make your lessons more meaningful. Think of new ways to adjust old lessons to meet the interests and needs of your new students. Establish the criteria for a project, but let the student artist put their creative signature on any assignment. Too often student artist's imaginations have been limited. If doing a still life, ask them to add one item that represents their culture, a cause they are passionate about, or their favorite past-time, school appropriate of course!

The basic definition of rigor is the quality of being valid. For educators, rigor is learning in which students demonstrate a thorough, in-depth mastery of challenging tasks to develop cognitive skills through reflective thought. Engaging the students in relevant studio experiences will improve the rigor and quality of their work.

To be resilient, a person must be able to rediscover or adjust to change; adapt despite risks. In a safe educational environment, student artist will feel secure, they will allow their personal creativity to flow, take risks they are not allowed in other classes, and be self-motivated to success.

Establish the relationship and relevance in your studio process. Allow the students to create significant artwork with rigor and they will become resilient in the process.

Tom Waggoner gave an update on House Bill 3, school district options and the NCLB Federal mandates in regards to certification requirements. The CEDFA Summit will June 10-11, 2010.

Following the meeting we had a wonderful reception at the Rachofsky House and a tour by Thomas Fulmer. It is amazing that this modern collection is available for student tours.

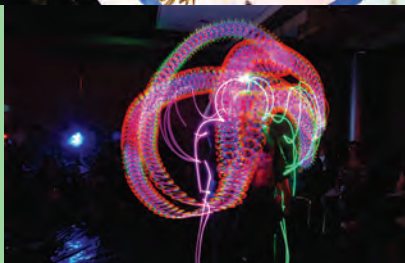
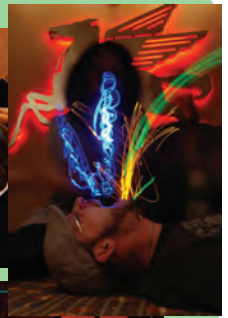

Changes Slated for High School State VASE Workshops

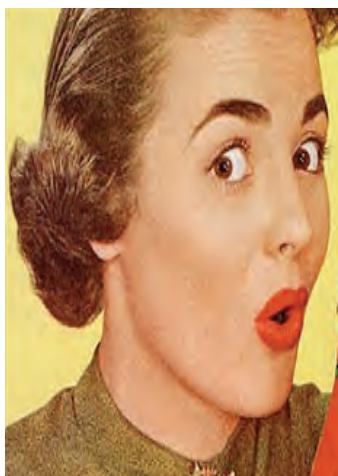
"To grow is to change. To have changed often is to have grown much."

The growth of VASE on the regional level, and subsequently the state level, has been overwhelming. With the possibility of 2000 plus outstanding high school VASE winners advancing to State VASE, some changes have been made to accommodate the extra participants for the 2010 State VASE event to be held at the University of Houston – Clear Lake, April 10th.

This year, Division I and Division II students will attend one longer workshop, which will give them the opportunity to complete a "portfolio worthy" piece of art. The work produced will be juried, and scholarship money and art materials awards will be given based upon those works. Those scholarships will be awarded during the awards presentation at the end of the day.

Division III and Division IV students will still select workshop sessions on line and attend two shorter workshop sessions. Advanced students will also have the opportunity to choose to attend the College Portfolio Review as one of the sessions. There will also be a separate Scholarship Workshop for advanced III – IV students which will result in scholarships given during the awards presentation at the end of the day.

The afternoon activities will feature the leisurely viewing of the State VASE exhibit, artist demonstrations, and an open invitation to visit with the College Portfolio reviewers. The University of Houston will also present important workshop sessions covering funding your college education and strategies for being successful in college. These sessions are open to students and parents.

The Visual Art Scholastic Event is a statewide curricular opportunity for middle school and high school students of art. VASE is the only art event of its kind in the nation where students can bring artworks created in their art classes to a regional event and be interviewed by a certified juror. The juror evaluates their work based on a standards based rubric and their understanding of the art processes involved in the development of their artwork. The team of jurors is comprised of area artists, university instructors, and art educators. Regional events are divided into 20 separate areas of the state each aligned with a TEA Education Service Center. Each region has a Regional Director that can be located on the VASE website through the Regional Locator. Only academically eligible high school students in grades 9-12 from Texas schools can participate in VASE. Since 1994 more than 125,000 artworks have been entered in Regional Events across Texas with over 13,000 selected to advance to the State VASE Event at the University of Houston-Clear Lake campus each April. At the state event qualified artworks receiving a Superior Rating are awarded a Medallion and the top seven percent of the state entries are granted Exemplary Status with the coveted Gold Seal Award. SUM09, SP09, WI09, FA09, etc....

SPECIAL CHARACTERS: No Smiley's, dingbats, or special characters (they are auto-eliminated by the design program).

TABS: Please use the tab key to indent paragraphs and for bulleted points (not spaces).

AT THE BOTTOM OF THE TEXT DOCUMENT: Include a list of the pictures to be used with the text and their file names, as well as the picture's captions.

Please send each picture as a **separate image file** –

ELIGIBILITY

- Entrants must be current TAEA members.
- Artwork must have been made within the past 3 years.
- Artwork must not have been previously entered in the Electronic Gallery.
- 2D or 3D artwork is accepted, in any medium.
- Limit 5 entries per person.

FEES

- Entrants must send a \$5.00 non-refundable fee per entry—all monies collected are used for prizes and Electronic Gallery expenses.
- Checks & money orders are accepted, made payable to: **TAEA Electronic Gallery.**

FORMAT

Electronic files: Must be saved in JPEG format on a CD. Identify each image with artist's name, address, title, medium, and artwork size.

- Save images at roughly 5 x 7" size, at 200ppi; the image should appear the way you want it to be displayed.
- Artist & artwork info should be in a Word file also burned on the CD.
