Creating a Reference PDF For 2026

Requirements for VASE Program Events:

Regional Events for High School VASE and Junior VASE are in-person. TEAM is adjudicated virtually. Whether Virtual or In-Person, we will use uploads in addition to information attached to artwork for all events.

Three things are required for each *HS and JV* Entry:

- Artwork Photo: Good-quality COMPLETED photo of the artwork (no mat needed for photo). Photo should be cropped and straightened; upload in JPEG format, no larger than 10MB. Only one image can be uploaded; multiple images of 3D & 2D relief artworks should be presented as a collage (2-5 images in collage saved as JPEG).
- <u>Reference PDF:</u> Reference image(s), sketches, and/or production notes should be compiled in PDF format and uploaded; PDF files should be no larger than 5MB.
- Online Student Intent Form: Completed online. (Artwork ID Form is printed and attached to entries).

The VASE Program Artwork Release Form will be collected for each student, alphabetized, and turned in at the Regional Event.

What do I put in my Reference PDF?

Reference image(s), sketches, and/or production notes:

When it comes to images, there is a difference between images you use as REFERENCES, and images you use for RESEARCH.

When you look at <u>photos of other artists' work</u> for RESEARCH purposes, <u>and don't copy</u> them, they are <u>not</u> considered REFERENCE images, <u>so they are NOT included</u> in the required Reference PDF.

The <u>sketch(es)</u> you draw <u>after</u> doing <u>RESEARCH</u>, along with <u>original sketches</u> from observation or imagination, are considered your <u>REFERENCES</u>, so <u>they are what you include</u> in the <u>Reference PDF</u>.

Your REFERENCE photos are the photos you took yourself, directed others to take of you, or photos from your family history (see Originality rules). Production notes explain your process as you were making your artwork.

What do I put in my Reference PDF?

Reference image(s), sketches, and/or production notes:

Summary for Teachers & Students:

RESEARCH: The student looks at NON-ORIGINAL image(s) to study, but does NOT copy them in part or as a whole into the art.

o NO: Students do NOT add RESEARCH images to the Reference PDF.

REFERENCE: student's ORIGINAL sketches / photos that ARE copied in part or as a whole into the art.

o YES: Students MUST add these REFERENCES to the Reference PDF.

Creating a Reference PDF File: 5MB maximum file size


The Reference PDF File can be created in:

- Microsoft Word (save as PDF)
- Microsoft PowerPoint (save as PDF)
- Google Docs (download as PDF)
- Google Slides (download as PDF)

Notice in the examples how the student typed the identifying information each reference needed.


For photo references, basic info should be entered in the Intent Form photo check-box type field.

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


Box 2: "I worked from one or more original sketches, observation, my imagination"



ARTWORK

I worked from observation on my acrylic painting. I looked in the mirror as I drew the image, and again when I was painting.

I worked totally from my imagination, no sketches. I wanted to show a forest on fire. First I painted a watercolor painting. Then I scanned it in and added effects in Photoshop to make the colors more intense, and add contrast.



Box 3: "I am entering an original photo"



This is my original photo. I took this photo at my house in the living room of my sister playing the piano in January. I did a whole photo shoot of things at home. I tried different F-stops to get different fevels of light.

Picture of my Process Notes:

I worked totally from my imagination-no sketches.

I wanted to show a goat climbing a mountain

First I looked up skeletons and how goat anatomy worked and operated. I found a few videos of how goat joints fit together and how they were able to be so agile

Then I looked up multiple four-legged armatures, and how to make one, so I knew how to simplify the skeleton and anatomy of a goat itself. After that, looked up different breeds of goats and how they varied in muscle shape and fur texture, to get a better understanding of how I wanted mine to look.

I worked from one or more family photos taken by my Mother when my Grandmother lived in the early 2000's at family gatherings. They are apart of my family's history. I wanted to do a front facing portrait, so I used key features from all the pictures to create the front facing view sketch which was original, and proved to be a fun and great challenge.

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

Important Information for Students!!!

If you have more words to write on an Intent Form question than is allowed, you can add the extra words to the Reference PDF. Your Juror can read it there.

If you are part of the Junior VASE Virtual Pilot Event, your Juror will use your Intent Form and Reference PDF to replace your Interview. Make sure your writing explains your artwork process completely!!!

TEACHERS: Start AND Finish artwork early!!!

- If you need further explanation and/or training, please contact your Regional Director as soon as possible before your Regional Event.

 Attend the Virtual Meetings your Regional Director offers.
- All parts of the Artwork Entry MUST be uploaded & certified by the FINAL DEADLINE, 10 days before the Regional Event. This is a NEW combined deadline for 2026.

There are **NO FIXES** allowed in VASE.

Please start VASE projects in the Fall when possible, and direct students to complete uploading in their dashboard by the STUDENT DATA deadline (3 days before the teacher's FINAL DEADLINE).
